


An ant can lift 20 times its own weight - 50 times their size! That would be like a human lifting a car!

A Bombardier Beetle probably got its name because it can make an EXPLOSIVE liquid spray out its rear end! The liquid can reach up to 212°F!

Paper Wasps are pollinators because they eat nectar, but they also eat other insects!

Japanese Beetles can fly as far as 5 miles, but are poor fliers and can be caught easily.
